

The **European University Institute (EUI)** is an international postgraduate and post-doctoral research-intensive university and an intergovernmental organisation with juridical personality, established by its founding member states to contribute to cultural and scientific development in the social sciences, in a European perspective. Its main campus is located in the hills above Florence in the Badia Fiesolana of San Domenico di Fiesole, Italy.

Established in 1972 by the European Union's founding member states, the EUI is an intergovernmental organisation providing advanced academic training and cutting-edge research opportunities in the fields of economics, history, law, political and social sciences, and beyond. The university's educational offerings span diverse fields and include programmes at various levels of study, such as [doctoral programmes](#), [fellowships](#), [master's degrees](#), and [executive education courses](#).

The Institute is organised into four main departments: [Economics](#), [History](#), [Law](#), and [Political and Social Sciences](#). Since 1993, the Institute has been home to the [Robert Schuman Centre for Advanced Studies \(RSC\)](#), which focuses on the critical issues facing Europe, fostering problem-centred research and serving as a bridge between academia and policymaking. In 2017, the EUI established the [Florence School of Transnational Governance \(STG\)](#) with its graduate, fellowship, and executive education programmes teaching and training current and future policymakers.

The EUI also houses [Europe's social science research Library](#), a fundamental resource for learning and research, which also serves as the official repository of EU publications and documents, and the [Historical Archives of the European Union](#), which preserve documents produced by European institutions, making them accessible to the public 30 years after their creation, and conserve private funds and collections of individuals, movements and international organisations that have played an important role in the European integration process.
